Hometown: Jacksonville, Florida
Residence: Mooresville, North Carolina

1996: Begins working for a Busch Series team after several years as a late model stock car driver

1998: Makes the jump to the Winston Cup Series as a member of driver Rick Mast's team

1999: Makes history as a member of Dale Jarrett's championship-winning team

2001: Joins Evernham Motorsports as team engineer for the No. 9 car driven by Bill Elliott

2003: Moves to the No. 19 car as team director and crew chief

2004: Leads Jeremy Mayfield to the inaugural Chase for the Nextel Cup

2005: Directs Mayfield to The Chase for the second year in a row

2006: After a switch-up within Evernham Motorsports, Francis joins the No. 9 car driven by Kasey Kahne

2006: Leads Kahne to The Chase, finishing eighth in points with a series-high six wins

2006: Out of the four crew chiefs/team directors to participate in every Chase for the Nextel Cup, Francis becomes the only one to do so with more than one driver

2006: Won the WYPALL* Wipers Crew Chief of the Race Award 4 times in 2006, finishing 2nd in the Crew Chief of the year standings

Hometown: Allentown, Wisconsin
Residence: Denver North Carolina

1993: Forms Reiser Enterprises

1997: After an injury to driver Tim Bender, he recruits Matt Kenseth to finish out the Busch Series season

1998: In the first full year with Kenseth in the driver's seat, the team finishes second in the Busch Series standings

2000: Team moves to Roush Racing to compete in the Winston Cup Series

2000: Gains first series win at the Coca-Cola 600 in Charlotte

2000: Team wins the Raybestos Rookie of the Year award

2001: Led by Reiser, the pit crew wins the Unocal 76 World Pit Crew Competition, setting a new record

2002: Team has a series-high five victories on its way to an eighth-place finish in the championship point standings

2002: Leads crew to a repeat championship of the Unocal 76 World Pit Crew Competition

2003: Leads Kenseth to a Winston Cup Championship with 25 top-ten finishes

2004: Guides Kenseth to the first Chase for the Nextel Cup, finishing with an eighth-place finish and two wins on the season

2005: Once again makes The Chase, turning one win and twelve top-fives into a seventh-place finish

2006: Finishes the season with four wins and a second-place finish in Nextel Cup points

2006: Won the 2006 WYPALL* Wipers Crew Chief of the Year Award with an astonishing 5 Challenge wins during the race season

1991: Joins DEI

1993: Becomes car chief (and tire changer) for Dale Earnhardt's Busch Series car

1998: Wins Busch Series title as a member of Dale Earnhardt, Jr.'s team

1999: Wins second consecutive Busch Series championship with Earnhardt, Jr.

2000: Moves up to the Winston Cup Series with Earnhardt, Jr. in the No. 8 car

2004: Helps Earnhardt, Jr. win the Daytona 500

2004: Guides Earnhardt, Jr. to the inaugural Chase for the Nextel Cup and a fifth-place finish in the standings after a series-high six wins

2005: Named crew chief of the No. 15 car driven by Michael Waltrip

2005: Leads Waltrip to three top-five and seven top-ten finishes in 26 races

2005: Named crew chief for the final ten races of the season for the No. 8 team

2006: Returns to The Chase and finishes fifth in points in his first full season as Earnhardt, Jr.'s crew chief

2006: Won the WYPALL* Wipers Crew Chief of the Race Award 3 times in 2006
